Sharing Their Shores Event

On the 3rd of November we ran a student and family event above Sime's Kitchen with a variety of activities and fun for all ages! Some of the visitors to the event was a group of Wildlands field school (University) students, one of which ended up returning to Kaikōura to run a split volunteer internship assisting with little penguin colony checks and with the banded dotterel project!



Research Projects

KORI was directly and indirectly involved in a number of research projects both locally and a little further afield. Dr Heidi Pearson from the University of Alaska, who is now one of our beloved committee members, undertook a 17 day dolphin photo ID project during Feb and March. 113 groups of dusky dolphins were spotted with 22,399 images obtained during the trip. Over 19 matches, including individuals photographed and ID'd in 2002 and 2006 studies were found (very exciting!) and this project revitalised a project that started over 40 years ago!

A theodolite that Dr Bernd Würsig gifted very generously to KORI was shipped to Thibaud Guerin of TriOceans in the Bay of Islands in December 2024 for a land-based survey project that ran from January to June. During this time, 42 surveys were conducted over a total of 174.5 hours from 2 different stations. Marine mammals were spotted 16 times (mostly bottlenose dolphins) with 150 marine mammal behavioural observations collected both within and outside of the Marine Mammal Sanctuary safe zones. 985 vessels were also monitored, providing valuable data on compliance across multiple locations and vessel types.

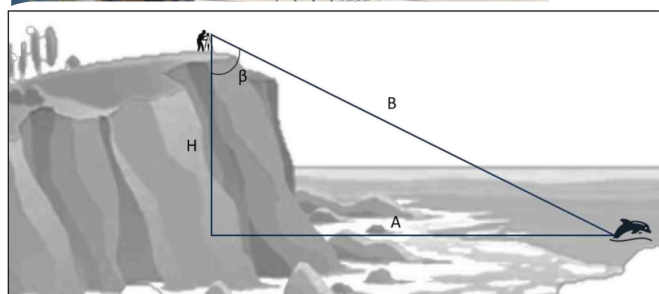
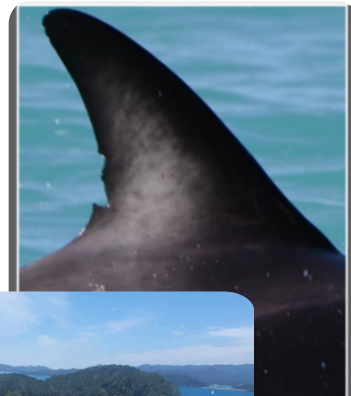


Figure 2. Theodolite tracking through trigonometry

South Pacific Helicopters Great Kaikōura Whale Count 2025



With some amazing sponsorship from Mainpower and headline sponsor South Pacific Helicopters, the Great Kaikōura Whale Count 2025 went off with a bang!

The sponsorship allowed us to provide stipends to the fabulous Florence and Gabriele to run and coordinate this year's GKWC count, based out of the South Pacific office space in town. They did a wonderful job coordinating the hundreds of volunteers that helped out throughout the month of June to spot, count and collate the data on each and every marine mammal spotted on our shores!

This year, the weather allowed for 22 observation days on the hill. In addition to the count itself, we were also able to run 3 inclusive community events, celebrating and educating the community and all visitors about the whales that visit us.



A total of 173 volunteers contributed to 495 scans and a total combined effort of 346 hours on the hill spotting the whales!

**The Great Kaikōura Whale Count for 2025 spotted:
119 humpback whales, 64 sperm whales, 62 pods of dusky dolphins,
2 orca, 1 blue whale and 1 southern right whale!!**

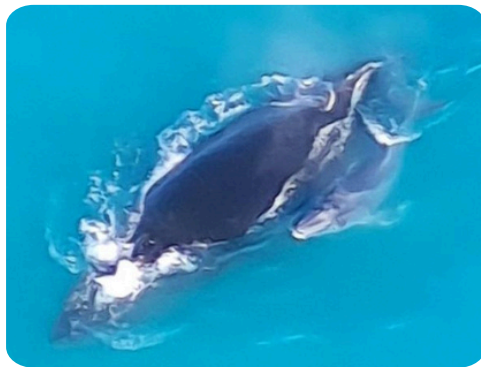
Structure & Financials
